REC HALL NEWS

The Rec Hall is a wonderful Town resource, available for community and private events. We all must be responsible renters, be respectful of the neighbors, and treat it with care so it is available for many years to come. Some ways you can help ensure the rental rates stay low are:

- Keep the noise down. Amplified sound must be turned off by 10 pm Sunday thru Thursday and by 11 pm on Friday and Saturday. Windows and doors should be closed when using amplified sound. Also remember to keep your party inside as Rec Hall rental does not include the public parking lot. You should be filling out an amplified sound form at the same time you fill out the Rec Hall Rental form.
- Remove your trash. You are responsible for removing all of your trash from the Rec Hall. This means taking it home with you.
- Clean up after yourself. You are responsible for cleaning the bathrooms, kitchen, and floors after your use. You must also put away the tables and chairs.

WATER CONSERVATION

Coupeville's higher summer water rates are meant to encourage conservation, however, water conservation should be something we think about year-round. Even a tiny leak can waste thousands of gallons of water every month.

- A constantly running toilet wastes 200 gallons of water or more EVERY DAY!
- A leaky faucet that drips at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year!
- A showerhead leaking at a rate of ten drips per minute wastes more than 500 gallons per year!

What can you do?

- Pre-1980 showerheads use five to eight gallons per minute. Today, 2.5 gpm is the standard. If you've got an older showerhead, consider replacing it with a new water-efficient model.
- Check your garden hose for leaks at the connection to the spigot. If it leaks while you run your hose, replace the nylon or rubber hose washer and ensure a tight connection.
- Only run dishwashers and washing machines with a full load.
- Most leaky showerheads and faucets can be fixed with pipe/plumbing tape.
- To test your toilet for leaks, add a few drops of food coloring to the water in the tank. After a few minutes if color appears in the bowl, you have a leak.
- The cause of most running toilets is an old, faulty toilet flapper. Replacing it is a relatively easy, inexpensive do-it-yourself project that pays for itself in no time.
