

## Ordinance "21"

An ordinance providing for removing obstructions of all kinds from the streets of Couperville, Washington, making it a misdemeanor to allow such obstructions to remain in such streets by property owners whose property fronts, adjoins or abuts on said streets or tenants in possession of property fronting, adjoining or abutting on said street and providing a penalty for the violation of the same.

Be it ordained by the Council of the town of Couperville, Washington:

1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to allow wood, lumber, boxes, stone, gravel, earth, or other rubbish or obstructions to remain in the streets of Couperville, Washington, adjoining, fronting or abutting on his property after being notified by street commissioner to remove the same.

2. It shall be unlawful for any tenant to allow wood, lumber, boxes, stone, gravel, earth, rubbish or any other obstruction to remain in the streets of Couperville, Washington, fronting, adjoining or abutting on the property occupied by him in Couperville, Washington, after being notified by the street commissioner to remove the same.

3. Provided however, that any person or persons may obtain permission from the street and sidewalk committee to have any of the things enumerated in section 1 and 2 of this ordinance in the street when it is necessary for building or other purposes.

4. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$10.00, or be imprisoned in the town jail not to exceed 5 days.

5. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its approval and publication according to law.
